
SULLIVAN, IL



Sullivan is a rural farming community in Moultrie County, Illinois, United States. The population was 4,326 at the 2000 census, and 4,396 in 2009. Nearby Lake Shelbyville provides recreation and some tourism.

Sullivan has 23 churches listed on sullivan,il/us. Sullivan is a predominately white community.

"Sullivan Elementary School, provides educational and social emotional services to 511 students, pre-kindergarten to 4th grade. 41% of our students come from low income families, increasing every year. The high percentage of students and families in need present issues with food insecurities, high mobility rates, difficulty accessing medical care, a lack of appropriate daycare, substance abuse, domestic violence, and a host of other problems that an elementary student shouldn't have to face on a day to day basis." CONTEXT | STORIES

J, age 8, lost his father unexpectedly prior to the school year. He, his father, and younger brother (age 6) were living in Nashville, Tennessee at the time. J and his brother moved to Sullivan just prior to the school year to live with their grandmother. According to the school social worker- J was struggling with the transition and unresolved grief. He wore earmuffs because the noise of the other students bothered him. I became a mentor for J. When I met J, he wore the earmuffs even when we were alone. He was withdrawn. Throughout the course of the schoolyear J and I have become close friends. J has also blossomed in his relationships at school. His grades are good. He has developed a close circle of friends. When I meet J and when I say goodbye to J- he gives me a big hug and a smile.

CONTEXT | SUMMARY

Students need the encouragement, the affirmation, the friendship of mentors who can show them that they are important, worthwhile, and loved.

Teachers and Staff need mentors to provide these stable relationships to facilitate their primary task of providing a solid education to allow for the student to experience academic success

Mentors for Life connects local community members with at risk SES students and one another to provide care in the way of Jesus which centers around 3 primary practices on a school-year rhythm.

CONNECT

A meal, celebration, and fellowship in the fall of the year to introduce mentors and teachers and discuss the needs of the school staff and the students.

RELATIONSHIPS

Weekly meetings at the school with the mentor and student will develop relationships and help as the teacher identifies the need.

Monthly opportunities for mentors to meet and share experiences with one another will allow for new friendships and supportive relationships.

CELEBRATE

A meal of celebration will culminate the school year (at Sullivan Elementary School) with mentors, students, and teachers.

FALL 2022 | Creation of initial 'pilot group' of 10 to 20 mentors. The program will start 2 to 4 weeks after the schoolyear begins. A kick-off dinner with speakers to provide education and background information will be hosted in the community. Weekly meetings with students will be scheduled. Monthly meetings will be scheduled at the Sullivan Library for mentors to meet for fellowship and discuss progress, ideas, hopes, successes and concerns.

SPRING 2023 | Celebration and a meal with school staff, mentors, and students.

FALL 2023 | Expansion of the Mentors for Life program and creation of a steering committee.
